As noted here and in my daily updates I have become more bullish, while still expecting a tradable pullback into the support. Technically, the longer the market consolidates above its breakout to new highs, the more likely the move continues. The problem here is that there is another school of thought that says, "Flat tops bring drops." And for 10 of the last 12 days we have had a pattern of up today down tomorrow with internals also alternating day by day. Also, there are more than a few big names that look tentative at best. I know that after the July run-up some sideways movement is in order, but there were some spectacular moves up on earnings. However, many of them petered out and closed midrange. Some of the biggest names and dividend payers are dramatically overbought and the trades are very crowded.

The Sunday morning shows all seem to be leaning in favor of Hillary, and the most often used expression is "a continuation of the status quo," and while the market loves the "evil you know vs. the one you don't know," I believe it spells deep trouble for both economic growth and the move toward even more public entitlement. Trump is Trump and without hearing anything substantive about his actual plans it's hard to see a reason to go along for a ride on that train. Unless he starts to do some explaining, it won't be as close as the polls show it now.

The A.A.I.I. numbers continue to point to no specific direction. The bull is still 20 under average and bears just a hair under average, while neutral is 34% over average. Clearly it is summer and nobody really wants to do much of anything. As Mike points out later in the letter, the consumer has stepped back into the checkout lines and spending increased. Also of note was the decline in inventories, which I personally consider a bright spot. The last thing I would care to see is write-offs of unsold goods on top of declining top line growth.

Remembering that the next two months tend to be well into the sub-par performance category for the market and we are overbought, there will still be trades to be made. Keeping that in mind, I will look for some of the laggards that can move while using close stops. The trade in FAST is an excellent example with a purchase price of \$42.15 and a stop less than 2% below.

For those of you who do not buy puts to protect your portfolio, there are many ETF's that are the inverse of the DOW. The symbols are **DOG**, **DXD**, **SDS**,**TZA** and **RWM**, which go up when the DOW, S&P 500 and Russell 2000 go down and down when they go up. The **DZZ** goes up double when gold goes down.

There were two closed out option positions.

12 CL August 72.50 Puts made \$ 252. 8 GLD August 125.50 Puts bought and sold the same day lost \$ 152

The net gain for options was \$ 100.

There were 3 closed stock positions:

The COTV made \$ 309, while the two SCO positions together sold on 7/26 made \$ 122.

The net gain in stocks was \$ 431.

For the entire year on closed out trades, our hypothetical profits increased by \$431 to \$19,645.

The options expire on the third Friday of each Month unless otherwise posted.

The Stock table has the following positions:

AA (2), EYES (2), FAST, HL, HOG, MOS(2), NBGGY, REPR, SAN, SPXU, SUN, TEXQY, TWTR

The options call for a \$ 2,500 investment unless otherwise stated; each stock position requires \$5,000 unless otherwise mentioned specifically.

The money management is based on a hypothetical \$ 100,000.

We are using a total of \$76,306 for the 16 open long stock positions.

The Open Option Positions require \$ 2,018.

This increases the margin requirement to \$78,324.

The 6 written Hecla Call positions reduce the margin requirement by \$ 312 lowering the margin requirement to \$ 78,012, leaving \$ 21,988 in cash.

Open position losses decreased by \$ 190 to minus \$ 8,249 despite last week's calculation error.as stock prices continued to improve.

These figures are approximate and there might be errors.

We have not counted the dividends received from many previous trades such as Apple, Colgate Palmolive, JP Morgan, Mosaic, North American Tankers, STNG, Santander, which pays over 5%, their Brazil affiliate BSBR and Blue Capital Reinsurance which was sold for a profit and many others.

The trading is hypothetical and we do not count commission costs.

Executions that have occurred at or near the open or close of trading sometimes vary from our actual numbers. For example, when something opens down and it is through our price, we take the next trade whether it is an uptick or continues lower. This sometimes results in a 50% trade that is slightly above or below the exact number.

Market Strategies Fundamentals

The Fed made their expected announcement of maintaining the same rates and the major indexes fell led by the DJ Transportation Index (7846.41) down119.57 or minus 1.50%. The Dow (18,432.24) lost ground each day last week for a total of 138.61 points or a loss of 0.75%. The S&P 500 (2173.60) fell just 1.43 or -0.07%. Both the Nasdaq and Russell were higher. The Nasdaq (5162) + 62 points or + 1.22%, while the Russell (1219.94) tacked on 7 points or 0.58%. Trading volume throughout the week was very light.

The NASDAQ Composite Index registered an impressive monthly gain of 6.60%. The RUSSELL 2000 small-cap stock index also did well in July up 5.93%. The S&P 500 Index closed at 2,173.60, up 3.55% for the month making a new all-time high. The DJ finished July up 2.8%.

GrubHub Inc (GRUB: \$ 37.92) + \$ 6.18 or + 19.5% had a top line beat of \$ 32.2 million or 36.5% and earnings surprise of 21%. GrubHub provides on line and mobile platforms for takeout orders serving independent restaurants across most of the U.S. **Gigamon Inc** (GIMO: \$ 46.72) + \$ 4.40 or + 10.4% beat earnings by 25% and revenues by 46%. Gigamon offers appliances designed to optimize the reliability, performance and security of network infrastructures. NutriSystem Inc (NTRI: \$ 29.58) + \$ 3.49 or 13.4% had an earnings beat of 6% and top line of 15%. **B&G Foods** (BGS: \$ 51.59) + \$ 5.00 or + 10.7% makes simple shelf stable food products like jellies and hot sauces.

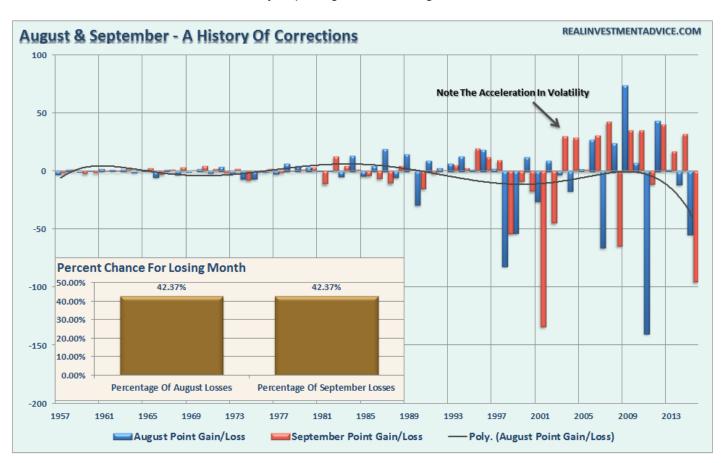
There were also disappointments: **Whole Foods Market, Inc** (WFM: \$ 30.48) fell \$ 3.24 a drop of 9.6%. Earnings were down 14%, and even though expected, the market response to the grocery sector has been disastrous. **Rent A center Inc** (RCII: \$ 10.80) fell 18.2% on both top and bottom line disasters. Earnings of \$ 0.41 vs \$ 0.49, had a miss of 8 cents or 42%, while revenues dropped by \$ 66 million or 8.1%. **Mobileye** (MBLY: \$ 47.91) ended the week with a small loss of \$ 1.69 or - 3.4% but had been down 15% on an earnings miss.

The speculative net long position in 10-yrT-note futures exceeded bearish or short positions by 185,521 contracts on July 26th, the day before the FOMC announcement. Speculators also sold and were net short the two-year T-note futures for the first time in six weeks in curve-flattening trades. Short Interest fell 1.4% on the NYSE as of July 15th, which generally shows no abundance of shorts, leading often to overbought conditions and then a sell-off.

The US dollar (DXYO: 95.52) - \$ 1.83 or - 1.9% collapsed against all the major currencies over the past week. It fell below the 200 day moving average and closed right on its 50 day price moving average. The Japanese Yen (0.9819) + .0378 was the strongest gaining 4% on the week. The Euro at 1.12 rose .0215 or + 1.95%. The Australian Dollar was strong, up.0139 to 0.7591 or + 1.87%. Even the battered British Pound (1.3247) + .0147 up 1.1% and Canadian Dollar .7668 + .0061, up 0.8% outperformed the greenback.

The GAAP PE on the S&P is now 25. To get down to a fair value of 19, it would need to drop 20%. To get to a fair value of 15, stocks would have to fall 40%. The next couple of year should be quite challenging for stocks and an ebullient opportunity for precious metals, Gold and Silver.

The months of August and September have the highest rate of corrections of all other months with both standing at 42.37%. Furthermore, the rise of computerized trading, as shown in the chart below, has led to a substantial increase in volatility of point gain/loss during these two months.



The US July employment report caps the week. Whatever comes from this report will likely be construed as negative, making trading from the long side difficult in the week ahead. Market participants do not expect a repeat of June's 287k jump. However, after the very low GDP number, another bad showing could set up a spiraling down move in stocks, seasonally appropriate. It would be the unexpected. The median guesstimate is for an increase of around 175k, which is above the three and six-month averages

(147k and 172k respectively). The unemployment rate may tick down to 4.8%. Average hourly earnings need to increase by 0.2% to maintain the 2.6% year-over-year pace.

Consumption, up 4.2%, was the mitigating factor, which was a concern to the Fed in its June report. This offset weakness from poor business investment, low government spending and the usual but ever deteriorating negative net exports. **Inventories fell \$ 13 Bil** following the huge increases each of the last four quarters; is presented on page nine, the next page. The decline in inventories together with improving Sales, up 2.4% and PCE plus 4.2% saved this report from being a true disaster.

July was a good month for stocks. The best industries were: Coal and Silver up about 20%. Auto and Truck Dealerships, up 15.5%; Recreational Vehicles, up 15.10%; Trucking up 14.53%; Truck Manufacturing, up 13.85%; Steel Manufacturing, up 13.35%. The biggest decliners were Oil and Gas Drilling, down 9%; Solar down 5.8%; Pharmaceutical Retailers down 5.10%; Banks-Regional-Europe down 3.6% and Confectioners down 3.30%.



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Market Strategies Economic Data

GDP estimates for the second quarter were shockingly poor. It showed output increasing at an annual rate of just 1.2% (Briefing.com consensus 2.6%) on the heels of a downwardly revised 0.8% increase (from 1.1%) in the first quarter. The price deflator was 2.2% (Briefing.com consensus 1.9%).

Real final sales, which exclude the change in inventories, were up 2.4%. That understanding will help mitigate the disappointment somewhat from the ugly headline number. There were annual benchmark revisions, covering the first quarter of 2013 through the first quarter of 2016, that were released along with the second quarter GDP report.

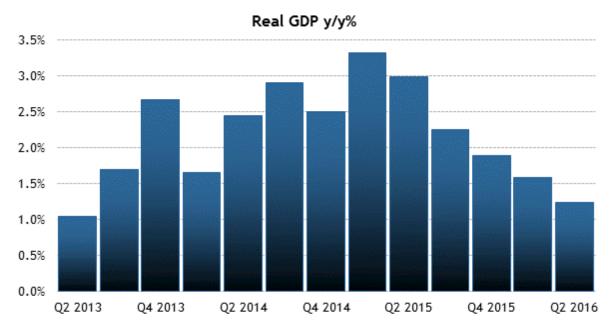
The bright spot in the second quarter report was consumer spending, as expected. Personal consumption expenditures (PCE) increased 4.2%, which was the strongest gain since the fourth quarter of 2014. The gain in PCE accounted for nearly all of the growth in the second quarter, contributing 2.83 percentage points. Net exports contributed 0.23 percentage points.

The biggest drag was gross private domestic investment, which subtracted 1.68 percentage points. The bulk of that subtraction was the change in private inventories, which subtracted 1.16 percentage points, although a downturn in both nonresidential and residential investment was part of the mix.

Government spending was down 0.9% and subtracted 0.16 percentage points.

The second quarter GDP report was far from what the market and economists were expecting. The Atlanta Fed's GDPNow model had things more right with an estimate for just 1.8% growth. The actual report is going to lend the GDPNow model added credibility on the forecasting front. At the same time, it will probably lend added credibility to the notion that the Fed will stay lower for longer and refrain from raising rates at its September meeting.

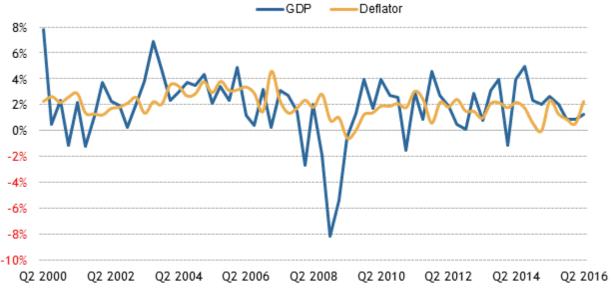

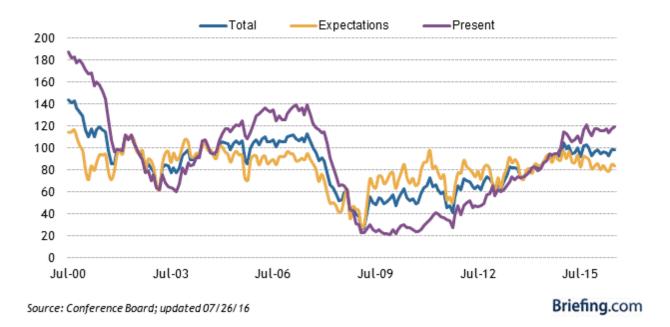

The Conference Board's Consumer Confidence Index dipped to 97.3 in July from a downwardly revised 97.4 (from 98.0) in June. The Briefing.com consensus estimate for July was 96.0, so this report was better than expected. The slight change can be attributed entirely to the Expectations Index, which fell from 84.6 in June to 83.3 in July as consumers softened their stance somewhat on the outlook for business and labor market conditions. The Present Situations Index rose from 116.6 to 118.3.

Confidence levels contribute to the outlook for consumer spending, but ultimately, spending activity rests predominately on income trends.

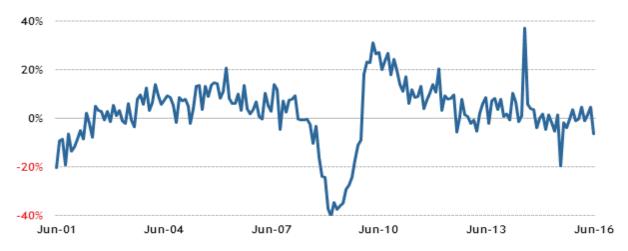


Durable goods orders declined 4.0% in June (Briefing.com consensus -1.0%) on top of a downwardly revised 2.8% decline in May (from -2.2%). Excluding transportation, orders were down 0.5% (Briefing.com consensus +0.2%) on the heels of a downwardly revised 0.4% decline in May (from -0.3%).

The June report was particularly disappointing since it revealed order declines in just about every category -- and a number of categories, including primary metals, registered a second consecutive monthly decline in orders. The notable exception in June was orders for motor vehicle and parts, which increased 2.6%. The only other area to see in an increase in orders was electrical equipment, appliances and components (+0.8%).

Nondefense capital goods orders, excluding aircraft, were up 0.2% after a 0.5% decline in May. This metric is seen as a proxy for business spending, so it holds a little silver lining for June; however, it would be remiss not to mention that they are down 3.8% year-over-year. Shipments of these goods, which factor into GDP computations, declined 0.4% in June after falling 0.5% in May.

Market Strategies Cycles

Money flows from harvesting made August a great stock market month in the first half of the Twentieth Century. It was the best month from 1901 to 1951. In 1900, 37.5% of the population was farming. Now that less than 2% farm, August is among the worst months of the year. According to the Stock Trader's Almanac, It is the worst DJIA and S&P 500 month from 1988-2015 with average declines of 1.3% and 1.0% respectively. August is also the worst month for NASDAQ (-0.4%) and Russell 2000 (-0.7%) over the same time period. However, in election years since 1952, Augusts' rankings improve: #5 DJIA, #4 S&P 500, #1 NASDAQ (since 1971), #1 Russell 1000 and #1 Russell 2000 (since 1979). This year, the market's performance in August will likely depend heavily on how July closes.

Contributing to this poor performance since 1987; the shortest bear market in history (45 days) caused by turmoil in Russia, the Asian currency crisis and the Long-Term Capital Management hedge fund debacle ending August 31, 1998 with the DJIA shedding 6.4% that day. DJIA dropped a record 1344.22 points for the month, off 15.1%—which is the second worst monthly percentage DJIA loss since 1950. Saddam Hussein triggered a 10.0% slide in August 1990. The best DJIA gains occurred in 1982 (11.5%) and 1984 (9.8%) as bear markets ended. Sizeable losses in 2010, 2011, 2013 and 2015 of over 4% on DJIA have widened Augusts' average decline. A strong August in 2014 of S&P 3.8% and NASDAQ 4.8% preceded corrections of 7.4% and 8.4% respectively from mid-September to mid-October.

The first nine trading days of the month have exhibited weakness while mid-month is strongest. Note the bullish cluster from August 12-17. The end of August tends to get whacked as traders evacuate Wall Street for the summer finale. The last five days have suffered in 13 of the last 20 years with the S&P 500 up only five times on the next to last day in the past 20 years. In the last 19 years, the last five days of August have averaged losses of: Dow Jones Industrials, -1.1%; S&P 500, -0.9%; NASDAQ, -0.6% and Russell 2000, -0.03%.

On Monday of expiration the Dow has been up 14 of the last 21 times with four up more than 1%, while on expiration Friday it has dropped in 10 of those 21 years, down five of the last six years (-3.1% in 2015). Expiration week as a whole is down slightly more than half the time since 1990, but some of the losses have been steep (-2.6% in 1990, -2.3% in 1992, -4.1% in 1997, -4.0% in 2011, 2.2% in 2013 and 5.8% in 2015). The week after expiration is mildly stronger up 16 of the last 26.

July's big rally has pushed the DJIA well into incumbent winning territory. As you can see below this has not been typical July market action. The usual second half of July weakness never materialized. Once the market realized that Brexit was no imminent threat or a clear and present danger, stocks quickly

erased the two-day post-Brexit selloff and rallied to new all-time highs on the DJIA and S&P 500 in relatively short order.

Since economic data has not impressed the Fed enough and continues to ebb and flow every month, it's unlikely we'll see another rate increase until after the election. Earning season went off without a hitch as companies overall did not disappoint Wall Street much, though we were not overly impressed.

Buoyed also by earnings numbers that mostly beat lowered forecasts and the promise of continued accommodative monetary policy for the foreseeable future, this rally has pushed the DJIA well above any of the rosiest scenarios for an election, which has historically, been a vote of confidence for the incumbent presidential party.

The European Stress test results were posted and results showed how well they would fare against losses incurred in a recession. Struggling Italian lender Banca Monte dei Paschi di Siena SpA was at the bottom of the list of 51 banks. Allied Irish Banks was second worst. Other major banks that suffered sizable hits to their capital buffers included Barclays, Deutsche Bank and UniCredit.

Greek banks were not included in the European Union tests but look to be improved relative to the problems created for other EU banks from the Brexit.

National Bank of Greece (OTCPK: NBGGY: \$ 0.22) is the 3rd largest bank in Greece by domestic gross loans in a highly concentrated banking market where the 4 main banks (NBG, Alpha, Eurobank, Piraeus) hold ~90% market share. At Q1 2016, NBG had total assets of €84 billion (excluding Finansbank) comprised of cash and liquid assets of €29.9 billion, net loans of €38.6 billion, deferred tax assets of €5.1 billion, and other assets of €8.7 billion. Finansbank is a Turkish bank with headquarters in Levent, Istanbul established in 1987. In 2006 the National Bank of Greece purchased the bank's domestic operations, spinning off the international operations under the name Credit European Bank. At the end of 2015, NBG sold the bank to Qatari QNB group in a deal worth 2.7 billion Euros. On June 2016, the acquisition of Finansbank was completed by the QNB group.

NBG returned to profitability in Q1 2016 on the back of lower credit loss provisions, with further upside still to be realized from lower funding costs and an expected rebound from Greece, which has become more important geopolitically.

NBG and the other Greek banks are in a much better position under a regime of capital controls with a stronger capital base following the 2015 recapitalization and it appears as though momentum is moving in the right direction. Whilst the sovereign has been significantly re-rated to an 8% yield, investors who can stomach the near-term volatility and liquidity risk can purchase NBG shares at current prices for earnings yields in the mid-20% range based on a realistic run-rate profitability target with the risk of further dilution considerably mitigated by the healthier capital and liquidity position, NPE coverage, and expected improvement in profitability.

NBG is mainly funded by deposits (€42 billion) and Eurosystem funding (€20.8 billion) which has decreased from the peak of €27.6 billion in Q2 2015 following the imposition of capital controls which reduced deposit outflows. Amongst the Greek banks, NBG has the strongest liquidity position with a net loan to deposit ratio of ~91%, with peers operating in excess of 130% and the lowest absolute dependence on ECB/ELA funding.

NBG's loan book in Greece totaled €44.3 billion in gross exposure and €32.5 billion net of provisions. NBG's Greek loan book is ~52% retail with €17.5 billion in mortgage loans, €5.4 billion in consumer loans, €4.0 billion in small business loans, and €17.4 billion in corporate loans. The main problem for NBG and peers is asset quality with NBG's stock of Greek NPEs totaling €22 billion (50% of domestic loans) at Q1 2016. Post-AQR, NBG has the highest provisions coverage among peers with cash coverage at 54% and total coverage including collateral at 110%.

Undervalued Small Cap Stocks

Lower Priced stocks that look to be a buy:

Repro-Med Systems, Inc (OTCQX: REPR 0.45)*

Fourth quarter preliminary net revenues will exceed \$3.2 million, representing a slight increase over the \$3.1 million of the previous quarter. Sales are led by the Company's proprietary infusion products. The Company's fiscal year ended February 29, 2016.

Andy Sealfon, Company President and CEO commented, "The military has expressed interest in our products for utilization in emergency applications as well as use in VA hospitals. We believe that because of our performance standards and the reliability of our products, we will provide them with great value and benefits."

The Company manufactures medical products used for infusions and suctioning. The Infusion product portfolio currently includes the FREEDOM60^(R) and the newer FreedomEdge™ Syringe Infusion Pumps, RMS Precision Flow Rate Tubing^(TM) and RMS HIgH-Flo^(TM) Subcutaneous Safety Needle Sets. These devices are used for infusions administered in professional healthcare settings as well as at home. The Company's RES-Q-VAC line of medical suctioning products is used by emergency medical service providers in addition to a variety of other healthcare providers.

NHIA is a trade association representing the interests of entities providing infusion and specialty pharmacy products and services to home-based infusion patients.

The Company's website is **RMSMedicalProducts.com**.

Repro-Med Systems, Inc has had an increase in sales each of the last four years. They finished the year of 2014 with \$ 11.2 million in sales reflecting top line growth of 29% from 2013. In each of the previous two years they had a 12% increase in sales. The company has had at least \$ 700 thousand of net income in each of the past four years and has no debt. The patented needle sets alone can give the company a huge growth potential. In my opinion, with new products coming on stream, the stock should trade between \$ 3 and \$ 8 in the next two years.

Enzo Biochem (ENZ: \$ 6.54) The stock moved from approximately \$5 a share to approximately \$6.50 from May 1 to early June. If you look at the chart pattern of the stock the big volume came in on May 9 which coincided with the Louis Navellier recommendation that was sent to you on that date. He recommended 5 stocks of which 3 (including Enzo) all had similar chart patterns with significant increases in trading volume. I don't know how much of that volume came from individual investors but the buying had lots of 100-500 share trades which tells me that individuals, not institutional investors were strong buyers of Enzo.

During the same time frame the Russell Index probably started to see some front running by Index funds or ETF's to take a position into Enzo's stock as they looked to be included in the Index. These funds mirror the Russell Index. The Russell is a two edged sword. The positive edge is that for Enzo it probably means 2-3 million shares will be bought. Enzo was included in the 2000 and 3000 Russell Index on June 10.

The Russell will hedge their long positions by shorting the stock against their long position to go neutral if they think the market shows weakness or if the fundamentals of the company change. If you remember when Enzo was removed from the Index a couple of years ago the short position was 4 million plus shares and the day Enzo was removed the shorts delivered their long position against the short to flatten

the position. The short position on that day dropped to 1 million shares. Enzo had a conference call on their third quarter release last week and I didn't see any change in the fundamentals. However those individual investors that bought on the Nave

llier recommendation don't know the Company and saw that they reported a loss for the quarter (even though they beat estimates) and may have taken profits.

The market in general was down 5 straight days and the index's that got long the stock may have shorted to hedge their position. That can be confirmed on the first two week short report due out next week. The short position at the end of May was 937,000 shares down from the mid- month short of 1,010,700. The stock has come down some 15% from its high which is not a big deal. To me it is just a technical move.

The stock is approaching oversold territory and as the fear grows the opportunity becomes bigger. The fundamentals haven't changed and in fact have become stronger with the latest AmpiProbe approval. Enzo has cash of \$50 million and no debt. There are 7 more cases to get settled in Delaware which can provide significant additions to the cash position. AmpiProbe will have more submissions to the New York regulatory agency this year. AmpiProbe is cheaper, better and faster than existing technology and that is a \$3 billion market.

This is an awesome potential for a 47 million share company and who knows what will happen if the NIH has positive statements on their Optiquel test for Uveitis. The stock is 50% owned by Institutions and funds, 15% by insiders and I guess 10% by hedge funds. That leaves some 11 million shares in the float. If the Russell causes 2-3 million shares to be bought the float then become 8-9 million shares. Good news can really move the price.

Target market priorities include golf cars and other recreational vehicles, electronics, and devices requiring rechargeable batteries.

In August 2016 Oakridge Global Energy Solutions will commence production of state-of-the-art Lithiumlon batteries. The company is currently in the process of soliciting bookings for presale orders with several key industries to include the federal government. Perhaps the most important takeaway regarding Oakridge Global Energy Solutions lies in its relationships that will make it one of the few world manufactures who are able to produce first generation lithium-ion technology that will surpass what is effectively being currently produced.

Furthermore, the company has developed an industrial design team that has incorporated a 21st Century contemporary art style to its cell products. Additionally, the company has numerous patients for its technology but perhaps the most interesting of those centers around the Nano-sized lithium thin film solid state batteries with a Nano encasement. This product in itself stands to propel the company into areas that currently only it has the rights to manufacture in the United States. The Nano lithium thin film solid state battery has a large upside market potential both domestically and abroad.

Oakridge Global Energy Solutions over the next several months will be entering simultaneously several markets that will be both exciting to watch its competitors scramble to justify their continued use of dated technology and inferior performance. Again, the company has progress along building the right partners, protecting its intellectual capital, and building a 21st Century industrial design team that has hundreds of man years' worth of experience to produce the world class product to capture market share quickly.

Lithium ion batteries deliver twice the energy of nickel cadmium batteries and are the fastest growing battery segment. Their growth and demand dynamically forward trending. They are lightweight and easy to maintain. They deliver superior electro-chemical output and provide highest energy density for weight, non-metallic and are rechargeable. In 2015, the OGES Pro Series golf car was launched at the annual PGA show, the largest golf show in the world. OGES plans to have a new factory producing its patented thin film solid state lithium ion batteries by 2017. OGES is commencing delivery of a small format prismatic to help several smart card customers reach the next generation. Their growth will be serviced by the new factory. These batteries are also in a rapidly growing demand for a variety of applications.

iSIGN Media Solutions Inc (ISDSF: \$ 0.0922) is public company trading on the Toronto Stock Exchange Venture market under the symbol ISD (TSX-V: ISD), and in the United States on the OTC under the symbol of ISDSF. The web site is www.isignmedia.com
